From the Executive Director

Villages are helping plan for community-wide vaccination clinics and honing transportation plans to get members to vaccination sites. The State's "Vaccinate All 58" Campaign website has detailed information about vaccination in California.

We will continue to send you the latest information about how to protect your members and volunteers from vaccine scams (see *COVID-19 Information & Resources* below).

The Governor's final Master Plan for Aging was released last week, and it names the promotion and adaptation of the village model in its two-year implementation plan. This is good news for our movement! I will be speaking with the Director of California's Department of Aging about next steps later this month.

We are days away from the inauguration of President Elect Joseph Biden and Vice-President Elect Kamala Harris. San Francisco Village Proposal for Villages to Work Together

On Climate Change & Climate Action Issues

San Francisco Village members are exploring what we might do, together with other villages in California, to participate in large, collective actions to slow and stop climate change and its resulting devastation.

Is your village formulating climate action strategies, either in a special interest group or as a village initiative? Is there interest in joining climate action organizations and following/participating in their work as a group?

This subject is right for villages at this time because:

- Climate change is a collective crisis and it requires collective, not individual, solutions
- Individual lifestyle changes are important, but our real power comes when we work together
- We need to focus on structural change in the form of new policies while at the same time continuing our individual commitments
- Women, young and old, are at the forefront of climate actions and solutions
- Older women are the core of the climate movement, working in collaboration with younger leaders like Greta Thunberg

These last two are particularly significant because, according to Village Movement California's 2018 member survey, 73% of our village members are women.

1/12/21 3 San Francisco Village members are considering joining one or two Bay Area nonprofits to follow their work:

- 1,000 Grandmothers Bay Area Elder women working to address the climate crisis. Auxiliary members are included - friends and relations, young and old. Particularly focused on climate justice.
- **350.0rg Bay Area –** Volunteers, working to:
 - Raise awareness and urgency about the climate crisis
 - Mobilize to demand action required to protect us all from the worst impacts
 - Support young people calling for a livable planet
 - o Dig into policy options to get real emissions reductions actions passed.

And there are many other organizations working on climate change in California. Are you familiar with any in your area? Two that work across the state are:

- Environment California A nonprofit political organization that lobbies for environmental legislation in the U.S. and California and is affiliated with Environment America and the Fund for the Public Interest
- Nature Conservancy of California "We work to protect the ecosystems, species and natural resources that make the Golden State unlike anywhere else.
 From stopping mega-fires to restoring our coasts, we access the power of nature to protect what matters: our home."

It would be powerful to have statewide participation in this vitally important climate change action movement by any or all California villages. We could definitely be stronger together and we could have significant impact: older adults across California, working on actions to make a difference in the climate crisis.

Please note that even as the incoming Biden administration confronts the immediate task of accelerating the pandemic recovery, the longer-running climate challenge is at the center of the administration's economic priorities. New! FTC Fraud Reporting Site

The Federal Trade Commission has a new website to make it easier to report potential frauds/scams to federal authorities and receive quick advice on what to do. Making such a report helps protect your community.

The types of scams and bad business practices you should report to the FTC include:

Identity theft

- Romance scams
- National Do Not Call Registry violations
- · Computers, the internet and online privacy issues
- · Telemarketing scams
- Credit scams
- Immigration services
- Sweepstakes, lotteries, and prizes
- Business opportunities and work-at-home schemes
- Health and weight loss products
- Debt collection, credit reports, and financial matters
